Her death shows us the futility of believing that just because we are young

that we have lots of time to obey the Lord. She seemed in very good health and had talked not long before to her husband and children and had been making decorations for the rehearsal dinner for her son's wedding in June. She was looking forward to attending her daughter's graduation from the University of South Florida, Instead, Satan snatched her life away and she did not attend those important milestones in her children's lives. But Satan could not claim her soul, for she was a godly woman, a truly "Worthy Woman" as in Proverbs 31:10-31. Donna's career was being a Christian woman; everything else hinged on that fact. The heart of her husband safely trusted in her, and her children rise up and call her blessed!

Donna had long-time personal friends whose insecure faith has tripped them up. She was kind and gentle in her rebuke of them, but plain spoken and minced no words in telling them how wrong they were. Life is so short at best that it ill-behooves us to

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Loving and Training Children by Marguerite Hinds

According to Titus 2:3-5, as an older woman, I am to admonish the younger women – to "love their children". Remember the Lord said, "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten" (Revelation 3:19). Many a young woman is tempted to take the easy way out and not chasten their children during the Lord's services. Children learn very young. A baby can be taught to be quiet during services, beginning at six to nine months. It takes patience and perseverance, but the rewards are great. The mother and everyone else will get more from the worship, and the child will learn respect.

In my many years, I have seen much of the following:

- Children crying, talking, squealing, and otherwise making noise, even during prayer, with no parental action.
- Children being taken out with no chastening and then being brought back only to start the noise-making or other disturbance all over again.
- Children going in and out to get a drink or to go to the restroom frequently with the parents not saying anything, or, worse, the parents setting that kind of "traveling" example themselves for their children to follow. Can we not be reasonably still for the short worship services?

- The desecrating of songbooks or bibles, and marking of the furniture. Once again, with no parental intervention.
- Whispering, laughing, or otherwise distracting the attention of worshippers.

Young women, do you truly love your children? If so, you will administer chastening when the child misbehaves. You will teach the importance of quietness and respect during the Lord's worship services. Remember, training oftentimes requires correction (Proverbs 29:17). Children need correction (Proverbs 22:15). Correction must be proper (Proverbs 3:11-12), and "If you beat him with a rod, he will not die" (Proverbs 23:13-14). Abuse is not recommended, but "He who spares his rod hates his son. But he who loves him disciplines him promptly" (Proverbs 13:24).

Again, do you love your children? "For whom the Lord loves, He corrects, just as a father the son in whom he delights" (Proverbs 3:12)

"Correct your son, and he will give you rest, yes, he will give delight to your soul" (Proverbs 29:17).

"God is greatly to be feared in the assembly of the saints, And to be held in reverence by all those around Him" (Psalm 89:7).
