So Soon Removed From The Gospel

atan has so polluted the Gospel of Christ that, even as a teen-ager, I was aware of the scarcity of congregations whose members strove to "speak where the Bible speaks and be silent where the Bible is silent." Mankind is so full of itself that, as our preacher friend, Rob Turner, said, "Man is always trying to whittle on God's end of the stick." In my reading, I have found some bits of spiritual wisdom that are in full accord with the Word of God. Following are some profound comments by an anonymous author.

"At the beginning of Christianity, when the Gospel was first

preached, the western world was overrun with Eastern magicians and soothsayers. They claimed the knowledge and ability to communicate with a higher world. Their theory was that between God and man were various grades or emanations by which we might gain the highest knowledge."

Known as Gnosticism, this teaching soon penetrated the Truth of God, blending into and perverting it even penetrated the apostles had died. Gnosticism flattered the pride of man by "tracing the origin of evil, not to the perverted

will of mankind, but to Creation, saying it was the necessary consequence of the union of matter and spirit. Thus, human perfection was not attained by following a lowly Savior in a narrow Way, but by embracing speculations concerning the nature of unseen mysteries." Guided by the Holy Spirit, the apostle Paul wrote the Colossian letter opposing such teaching, which included false humility and the worship of angels (Colossians 2:8-10, 18). In Christ dwells all the fullness of the Godhead bodily and in Him we are complete. Christ is the only mediator between God and man (Colossians 3:17).

Gnosticism was a great enemy of the Gospel of Christ, but certainly not the only one. The book of Galatians sets forth the problem of Judaizing teachers who taught that "the benefits of the Gospel could be appropriated only by meeting the requirements of Judaism, (circumcision), and that through this door only could they enter the Christian fold. Paul wrote, countering this false teaching, showing that Jesus, Himself, was the fulfillment of the promise to Abraham, not the Jewish nation. The Law of Jews was ADDED because of transgres-

sion. Its purpose was as a tutor leading to Christ, who justifies by faith and obedience to Him. Christ's death for Sin made the Law obsolete. Christ took it away, "nailing it to His cross." (Colossians 2:14; Ephesians 2:11-19).

The book of
Ephesians is a general letter warning
Christians not to fall
back to the evil habits
of their former lives, but
concerns how a disciple of Christ should
"walk", worthy of the

"vocation wherewith ye are called—endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." The child of God must be loving, forgiving, clothed in the armor of God, being filled with His spirit so that the fiery darts of the evil one are quenched (Ephesians 6:10-18).

These three books (Galatians, Ephesians, and Colossians) discussed here in brief are filled with so much food for our spiritual needs. Let us all study the Word of God daily. Physical food will sustain the hungry body, but spiritual food sustains and brings salvation to the hungry soul.

Her dad tried his best to take care of them on his own but after a year he met and married her stepmother Birmah Dee Albright. She took on the three girls, and eventually they added a son, George, and another daughter, Cookie.

She whould have graduated in Georgia in the eleventh grade, which was the norm at the time in that state, but she moved to Tampa and lost some

of her credits and had to work hard to graduate on time from Hillsborough High School. She took a correspondence course from University of Tampa. With the help of several wonderful teachers, she graduated at 17 in 1949. Then she returned to Fairfax, SC, where a young man named Buddy Nicholson was working for her father on his construction team. Janie could quote passages and tell you where to find something in the Bible most of the time without looking it up. She was an encourager who used praise and support to build up every preacher, teacher, and Christian she encountered. She was so proud of helping HoJung Chong learn English and learn about and become converted to Christ. Janie Nicholson was proud of all her children and their accomplishments, no matter what they were. She encouraged all to do their best at whatever they did. It was just part of who she was. She loved being a wife, mother, and homemaker, and relished her duties to provide a happy home for her husband and family.
